**1640 & 1763**

Madam: I have sent this messenger our purpose, & by this letter  
to give you for face an account of your commands as to assure  
you y<sup>e</sup> joynture of my sisters was both sealed, & delivered  
for hir use, & is safely layd up, & for your doubt in y<sup>e</sup> sufficiency  
of it m<sup>r</sup> Moore must saye much in y<sup>e</sup> opinion of y<sup>e</sup> world  
whor I conceive drew it, & his judgment much questionable  
if he sayes in such matter hisself; yet that there may be  
some slips in y<sup>e</sup> most carefull, & able lawyers late examine  
hath well assured me, but in this joynture there is a clause as  
I rememb. to bind my brother for farther security if in  
cause any scruple shall arise now if upon your Ladishippes  
farther consideration you shall thinke necessary to advise  
wth counsell I shall be ready to attend; for his addition to  
y<sup>e</sup> joynture he have expressed him selfe very freely to assure  
it when it shall please God to ad to his estate, my Lord  
Maynard is not yet my neighbour butt for soone as he is I shall  
waite upon him. Madam for feare of being tedious I shall  
ventur y<sup>e</sup> questioning when I shall be made happy by your  
p<sup>r</sup>sent concerning any thing that is forgotten or in any thing  
that I may serve you as.

& Sir's first wife daughter of Sir Lord Starbroke of Harrington. This endorsement by Lady  
Talbot is with reference to her daughter Susan, who mar<sup>d</sup> to Sir Henry Filston 1<sup>st</sup> Bt
